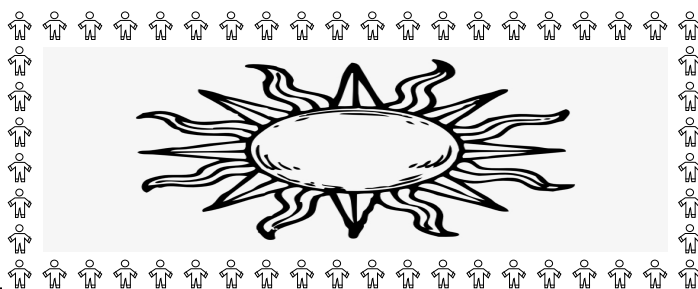

ACT to prevent heatstroke

A hot car is one of the most dangerous places for a baby or a young child. Cars can heat up to 19 degrees in 10 minutes, and cracking a window will not provide enough air for a child stuck in a hot car. Parents and caregivers can use ACT to help keep children safe. Avoid heatstroke-related injuries by never leaving children alone in the car, and locking cars to prevent children from getting in. Create reminders, like a stuffed animal, in the car to remind you that you need to get a child out when you exit. Take action. If you see a child alone in a car, call 911 immediately. Un automóvil caliente es uno de los lugares más peligrosos para un bebé o un niño pequeño. Los automóviles pueden calentarse hasta 19 grados en 10 minutos, y abrir una ventana no proporcionará suficiente aire para un niño atrapado en un automóvil caliente. Los siguientes son consejos para que los padres de familia y cuidadores ayuden a mantener seguros a los niños: Evite las lesiones relacionadas con ataques cardíacos provocados por calor al no dejar nunca a los niños solos en el automóvil, y cierre el automóvil con llave para evitar que los niños entren. Cree recordatorios, como un animal de peluche, dentro del automóvil para recordarle que debe sacar a un niño cuando usted salga del auto. Tomar acción. GOSPEL MEDITATION -**June 18, 2023****11th Sunday in Ordinary Time**

In the backyard of the house where I live with other priests, there is a lemon tree which produces a huge amount of fruit. One evening in the spring I needed some lemons for a chicken dish. I glanced from the kitchen and saw the tree bursting with large, bright, gorgeous lemons, hanging thick on seemingly every branch. Turning to Fr. Bob (I'll change his name to protect the innocent) who sat on the couch, I said, "Father, could you pick a few lemons for me?" He said sure and into the backyard he went. He returned a few minutes later empty-handed. "John, there's no lemons. Sorry." I said, "What are you talking about?" I looked again and saw the grapefruit tree on the other side of the yard, which had recently been picked clean of fruit. He didn't see the abundant fruit because he was looking in the wrong place!

Like Fr. Bob, we sadly don't see the fruit all around us. We think that the culture is spiraling down, young people avoid church, and the future looks bleak. Why go out into the world and work? The world looks like a fruitless tree.

Jesus doesn't see things that way. This week he tells us, "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few." Look again: there is spiritual fruit hanging all around us! The lonely ready to be visited. The sick ready to be healed. The forgotten ready to be remembered. The poor ready to be treated with dignity. The sad ready to be consoled. The young ready for the Gospel. So, let's ask the Lord to send laborers to get to work. And he will. He might send you and me. Just remember to look at the correct trees.

MEDITACIÓN EVANGÉLICO -
18 de junio de 2023
11º Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

Hay mucha gente cansada y desilusionada, están ya abatidos sin esperanza. Tantos migrantes que salen de sus países en busca de mejor calidad de vida. Buscan líderes que hablen con la verdad, que los guíen y los orienten. En tiempos de Jesús, y ahora pasa lo mismo, la gente caminaba sin rumbo, como ovejas sin pastor. Por eso Jesús ordena a sus apóstoles: “No vayan a tierras de paganos ni entren en pueblos de samaritanos. Diríjense más bien a las ovejas perdidas del pueblo de Israel (Mateo 10,5). Los envió para sanar enfermos, resucitar muertos, limpiar a los leprosos y echar demonios. Esa era la tarea: ayudar a la gente a liberarse. “La cosecha es abundante, pero los trabajadores son pocos. Rueguen, pues, al dueño de la cosecha que envíe trabajadores a recoger su cosecha” (Mateo 9, 37-38). Se necesitan pastores fieles y trabajadores que ayuden a las personas a encontrar a Jesús. La comunidad debe rezar para tener vocaciones sacerdotales y religiosas, a la vez que laicos comprometidos con el Evangelio, que sean testigos y den testimonio de lo que predicán. “No estamos llamados a servir solo para tener una recompensa, sino para imitar a Dios, que se hizo siervo por amor nuestro. Y no estamos llamados a servir de vez en cuando, sino a vivir sirviendo. El servicio es un estilo de vida, más aún, resume en sí todo el estilo de vida cristiana: servir a Dios en la adoración y la oración; estar abiertos y disponibles; amar concretamente al prójimo; trabajar con entusiasmo por el bien común” (Papa Francisco).

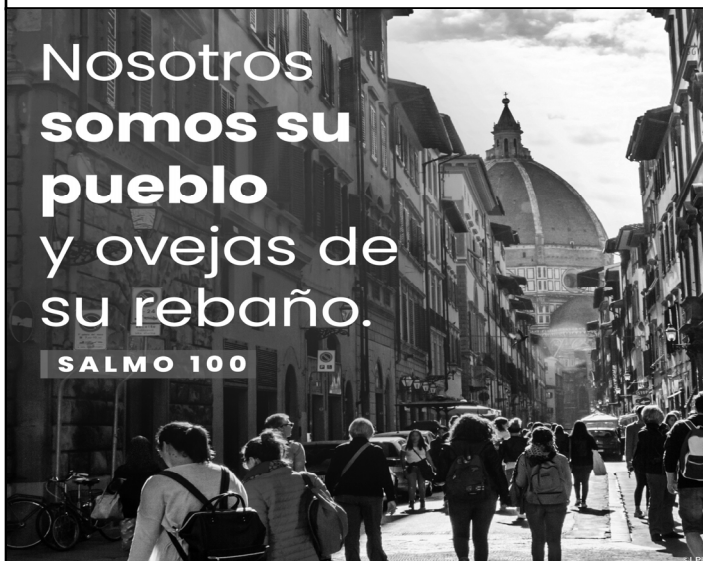

SAINT OF THE WEEK – EXAMPLES OF OUR FAITH

Ven. Mary Angeline Teresa McCrory

Short Bio — Great for social media or in your bulletin

Venerable Mother Angeline founded the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and the Infirm in New York. She provided healthcare, housing, and dignity for the elderly making certain that the people in her care enjoyed a life full of community and joy during their advanced years.

Biography

Venerable Mother Mary Angeline was born Brigid Teresa McCrory in Ulster, Northern Ireland. Her family moved to Scotland beside Holy Family Church in Mossend when she was seven years old and, due to her exposure to the sisters who frequently begged for alms for the aged and the infirm in their care, she became interested in the religious life. A couple years later she changed the spelling of her name from Brigid to Bridget due to her love of the French language. She helped in the church next to her home by arranging flowers and received the pastor's blessing to pursue her vocation.

When Bridget was 19 years old, she made her Novitiate in La Tour, France with the Little Sisters of the Poor, and took the name Sister Angeline de St. Agatha. She was sent to the United States after her final vows in 1915.

For the first 10 years of her time in the United States, Sister Angeline served her congregation. In 1926 she was appointed as Mother Angeline, Superior of a Home of the Little Sisters of the Poor in the Bronx in New York. During this time, she felt a call to expand the ministry of the Little Sisters of the Poor to also serve the elderly throughout New York City and to incorporate new methods to minister to the unique needs of those living in the United States. With the blessing of Cardinal Patrick Hayes, the Archbishop of New York, she and six other sisters were granted permission by the Vatican to start a new congregation to accomplish these goals.

The Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and the Infirm was established in 1929 and was the first American Community of religious sisters founded specifically to care for the aged. The congregation, with the enthusiastic support of the Carmelite friars of New York, became formally affiliated with the Carmelite order in 1931. Mother Angeline served as superior general for nearly 50 years until 1978! The order created homes for the elderly where people could be cared for and live both assisted and independently in community instead of aging alone, assured of care for their health and care for their spirits.

Mother Angeline was known for her loving kindness and service to the elderly. She never missed an opportunity to clasp the hand of an aged person stressing how important human touch and kindness was. A warm person, she would say, "If you have to fail, let it be on the side of kindness. Be kinder than kindness itself to the elderly." She died on her 91st birthday in January of 1984.

Her cause for sainthood was introduced in the Diocese of Albany in 1989 and Pope Benedict XVI formally acknowledged that she lead a life of heroic virtue, declaring her Venerable. Her Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and the Infirm still engage the elderly in ministry today. They continue to run 18 elder-care facilities, provide long term housing and healthcare, as well as assisted and independent living in both the United States and in Ireland. The Vatican is currently investigating the validity of miracles reported to have happened through Mother Angeline's intercessory prayer which, if validated, would move her cause for sainthood forward.

Prayer

Almighty and Eternal Father, we thank You for the inspiration You gave to Your daughter, Mother M. Angeline Teresa, to establish the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and Infirm, and to provide loving care for countless elderly men and women with compassion and a respect for their dignity and a regard for life in all its stages. In particular, moved by her example of prayerful trust in Your mercy, we ask You through her intercession for this special intention (pause to add your petitions for healing, etc.) If it be Your gracious will, grant that the virtues of Venerable Mary Angeline Teresa may be recognized and provide a lasting example for Your people.

We ask this through Our Lord Jesus Christ, Your son, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, God, forever and ever.

Amen.
